Travis Ogden responds: It is both. Over the years I have made quite a few of the cuffs using 6 gauge. I think it makes a beautiful cuff but when I taught it in a class, most of the ladies struggled with the heavier gauge. Consequently, I made the one in the article using 8 gauge. In fact, I have also made these cuffs with 10 and 12 gauge. I hope this helps.
